PROGRESS OF THE BAXTER COUNTY HISTORICAL SOCIETY

December 2, 1980 - About 60 members and guests enjoyed the old-fashion pot luck dinner at our Historical Society Christmas meeting.

The tables had red or green checked oil cloth and cotton tablecloths. Kerosene lamps and cedar garlands were used on the tables.

The food was plentiful and delicious. The menu included squirrel and dumplings, chicken with dressing and gravy, turnips, turnip greens, sweet potatoes, pinto beans, baked beans, black-eyed peas, cold slaw, fried apples, apple-sauce, home made light bread, cornbread, butter, wild grape jelly and sorghum molasses. For dessert there was apple, custard, pumpkin, gooseberry and sweet potatoe pies. Also, an upside down cake and persimmon pudding. There was coffee, buttermilk and sassafras tea to choose from.

After dinner, several members brought "show and tell" articles they treasured from past years.

January 6, 1981 - Our Vice-President, Quinby Smith, interviewed Elmer Perry, a native of this area and a former "Village Blacksmith". He was born March 26, 1895 at Big Flat. His family raised cotton among other crops, getting 22 bales a year and they also had 1/3 interest in a cotton gin. Cotton was raised here on low-lands until the first dam was built, flooding the low areas.

Mr. Perry joined the army (W.W.I). There he was sent to the horse shoeing school. It took most soldiers 3 months to finish the course but he received his diploma in one week with a grade of 88. He had the diploma with him to show.

The Elmer Perry family moved to Mtn. Home in 1932 and lived on a 40 acre farm south on Arkana Road. They raised 8 children. He rented a shop where the Home Savings is located. He could have bought the land, building, tools, etc. for \$600.00. The shop had a forge, anvil, tire bender, shrinker and drill. He could fix anything. He shoed 7 to 8 horses a day at 10¢ a shoe, 15¢ for fitting. Horses have corns the same as people and they had to be removed or the shoe built for protecting the corn. He made wagon tires and one summer he put on 110 tires. Welding was done by heating and tempering. He made tools and also made spears for fishing.

Mr. Perry closed his shop in 1945 and started building houses. There were W.P.A. workers then and they earned \$1.50 a day. He built the house he now lives in on College and 2nd Ave. One time he got a splinter in his hand as he had done many

times, but this one became infected. This had a permanent effect on his hand and he could no longer get a tight grip on his hammer.

Mr. Perry recalled seeing Guy King as a strong young man helping his father getting sand and gravel. They knew exactly where to find the best.

I am trying to trace my family history and was wondering if you have on the 1880 Census, Three Brothers, Baxter County or Mtn. Home, a Richard Neal Thompson or James House. I understand my grandfather, Richard Neal Thompson, died there about 1897 and my great grandfather, James House, died there about 1906. He was a Civil War Veteran. Maybe you have a death or cemetery record. My grandmother, Martha Jane Thompson, should be on the 1900 Census, same Township and County. Any information at all that you can give me on Richard Thompson or James House will be appreciated. Is it possible for me to get a copy of the 1880 or 1900 Census' for Baxter County?

COTTER CITY COURT RECORDS

The following charges were copied from the Court records on file at the Cotter City Hall. These few charges were the out-of-the-ordinary ones on record. At that time, the most common charges were for "gaming" (shooting craps, gambling, etc.) or for "disturbing the peace" (fighting in the streets, etc.).

February 17, 1913 - Arthur McCuistou and Charley Thompson were both charged \$1.00 for jumping on trains in violation of Ordinance 34. They were arrested on sight by Marshall Harrison. They each also had to pay Court costs of \$2.80.

November 24, 1913 - Harvey Anglin was charged \$5.00 for riding a horse on the sidewalk in the city of Cotter.

January 17, 1914 - Jack Cole was charged \$1.50 plus costs for assault and battery upon the person of L. S. Fleming.

January 19, 1914 - Ralph Denton was fined \$1.00 plus \$2.30 Court costs for disturbing the peace by running a horse at unusual speed on the streets and alleys in the town of Cotter.

October 2, 1915 - Georgie Elliott was disturbing the peace - profanity. The Court assessed her a fine of 1¢ and remitted all costs in the case.

WOLF FAMILY HISTORY (Cont.)

This letter has been copied exactly as it read with no corrections of spelling or punctuation. It may appear to be a little disjointed, but one must remember that the author was 74 years old and recalling things from his boyhood. This letter is from Joseph M. Wolf, son of Major Wolf.

Dated 1915

Page 1

Major Jacob Wolf was born in North Carolina May 12, 1786. Moved from there to Kentucky thence to the Territory of Arkansas in 1818 settled at the Mouth of North Fork of White River. White River was the line separating the Territory of Arkansas from the Indian Country. Being a splendid Mechanic he soon had erected a Black Smith and also a shop for wood work for making all kinds of furniture for the use of the immigrants. Both of which was a great blessing to the Country. He did a great deal of work for the Indians,

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making tomahawks butcher knives and arrow heads for them for which he took in payment pelts dried venison ---- and wild honey which he shipped to New Orleans by means of the old flat boat. On these trips he would take with him a keel boat and have it at the mouth of White River. The goods he took in exchange for his products was brought to the mouth of White River by steam boats and then put on the keel boat and from thence the boat was poled up White River to the Mouth of North fork where he established a trading post. A Great deal of his trade was with the Indians.

Page 3

The picture of the house I send you was put up along about 1826 or may be a few years later. My father died January 1, 1863. The picture I send you was taken near 40 years after. It seems to have been badly used. One room forming an L and the galleries having been torn away the chimneys were of brick but now seem to (be) patched up with rock. I am his youngest and only son (son) now living. I have two sisters one younger than myself living. He was Major of the Militia. He owned three seven (37) farms at his death. I know the name of but one Indian.

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this was Peter Cornstalk it seems he was an official among them My brother George Wolf on his way to California in 1849 made it a point to visit him on his rout, I do not know who gave the name of North fork It is very well named as it runs very nearly North He was the first settler of the place The place after becoming new Liberty and the County Site Court was held in the South upper room above which was 20x30 feet I have been told the old Davee Walker who at that time was a distinguished lawer (lawyer) of the state pled law in this room wearing moccasins as the indians did

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I do not recollect of any special festivities having been held there only it was the stopping place of comers and goers as there was no other place where accomadations could be had Lawyers on their circuits made this headquarters as also all clergymen After the county site was moved It was located at a point 8 or 10 miles down the river where the court house was built of Cedar logs Here is where the pun came in about the pecker wood eating up the Court House in Izard Co Ark which I (was) told they virtually did after the county site was moved further down the river to Mt Olive

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I have heard that Sam Houstons brother stoped with my father for how long I do not know I was told he kept books for my father or may be he just posted them while stopping with him I think his name was John P. Houston as I am the only living male of this once large family I send you picture of myself you can put it to any use you see fit.
